

Honoring our 40 year History

Dear Friends of the Christine Center,

On October 11, 2020, the Christine Center celebrated its 40th Anniversary. How do we capture the struggles and successes of our rich 40-year history in just a few pages? Within this commemorative issue we have worked diligently to present highlights of our humble beginnings; a snapshot of our current endeavors; and a glimpse into our future plans through and beyond the country's unprecedented pandemic.

The Christine Center was founded as a place of retreat supported by the vision of Sr. Virginia Barta, OSF: "We are One." Sr. Virginia prayed for guidance and felt directed to a 251acre property in Willard, Wisconsin. After an appeal for contributions to numerous religious communities across the country, Sr. Virginia was successful in raising sufficient funds, which would allow her dream to become a reality. On October 11, 1980, greeted by the splendor of a colorful fall day, Sr. Virginia, and Sr. Davina Pietz, OSF arrived at the farm property, which would become The Christine Center. A caravan of cars packed with thirteen friends, household supplies, 25 plants, and Muffin, a collie-mix canine companion, accompanied the two Sisters.

Within a few days of their arrival, the reality of the harsh Wisconsin winter began to set in. Beyond determination and a sense of resiliency, it became apparent that the Sisters' rural skill sets were limited. Wood needed to be chopped for fuel, and parcels of land needed to be prepared for seasonal planting and harvesting. Sr. Virginia wanted the Center to

become self-sustaining; relying on the resources of what the land and labor would provide. Sr. Virginia knew the tasks she faced were larger than she and Sr. Davina could accomplish on their own, and that help from willing volunteers would be required for her vision to become a reality.

After a rain-drenched day, the Sisters' vehicle became stuck in a muddy field, and their beloved dog, Muffin, had ran away. The loss of her dog prompted her to search and knock on the doors of neighbors. Unfortunately, Muffin, was never found; however, her efforts transformed neighboring strangers into new friends. These "angels" donated supplies and assistance to construct dwellings, and assisted with planting, harvesting, raising goats for milk, and bees for honey. Her hope was that the growing community would live peacefully, grow spiritually, and together promote global transformation.

A variety of circumstances necessitated that Sr. Virginia depart the Christine Center in 1992. Sr. Johanna Seubert, FSPA arrived at the Center in 1987 and began to work closely with Sr. Virginia. Sr Johanna has continued to reside at the Center for 33 years, assuming a variety of administrative roles, as well as serving as a Diamond Approach teacher and spiritual guide for many retreatants. We asked Sr. Johanna to share her understanding of the Center's vision, "Spiritual Deepening for Global Transformation" in this commemorative issue.

The year 2020 has proven to be a challenge and test of Leadership resiliency with our temporary closure in March due to Covid-19. Although we have needed to postpone our plans for our 40th Anniversary celebration, the Board and Administration continues to actively engage via Zoom to plan for and assure the Center's sustainability.

Our Program Committee is working to revitalize our programming, including several new unique opportunities for spiritual growth. One of our programs, Seasons of Deepening, a 12-month onsite and online offering will launch later this year and is highlighted in this issue.

Our Building and Grounds Committee has also participated in the creation of a Master Plan for the Center, as well as a plan to prioritize

the stabilization and revitalization of campus structures. Many of our beloved hermitages, built nearly 30 years ago, have begun to deteriorate due to weather and inconsistent upkeep. Numerous repairs have already been made over the last 10 months. To continue to preserve our rich legacy, we are launching a 40th Anniversary fundraising initiative Preserve Our Heritage, which we introduce in this issue. Our hope is to raise \$100,000 to

assist us with needed repairs and operations. Carl Greer, a friend of the Center, has provided us a \$25,000 matching grant to stimulate participation and help us achieve our goal.

Within this issue we also honor the legacy of Sisters who have supported the Center and our mission over the last 40 years. They continue to serve as a resource to Leadership in their current role as Resident Partners in Mission.

Finally, as we celebrate this 40-year milestone, we express our gratitude to present and past Board members and our many volunteers, who have devoted tireless hours of service in numerous capacities. A special note of thanks is extended to all the friends and donors of the Center, who have provided financial assistance during this unprecedented temporary closure. We are blessed by a legacy of donors, and by our Founder's Circle, who continue to support the Center's ongoing development. The generosity of these donors has allowed for the creation of the main Center building in 2000 and the Chapel and meeting room spaces in 2010.

Happily, we re-opened the Center to onsite private retreats in May, and to onsite Programs in September, with limited reservations, so that we can adhere to safety protocols and protect the health of our visitors and staff.

Looking forward, the Center continues to be a vital resource for our times and for future guests.

We await your return and welcome your next visit as THE STILLNESS CONTINUES TO CALLYOU.





PRESERVING OUR HERITAGE

Truly the Christine Center is indeed a story of humble beginnings.

The Christine Center began in a refashioned barn that eventually housed a meditation hall, bookstore, and chapel. Another barnlike structure was demolished. The wood was recycled as a resource to construct small housing units that became known as hermitages. Since these units had no running water, they were void of kitchen and bathroom facility. Shekinah, the current house of the Sisters was used for cooking and communal dining. By 1982 four hermitages were constructed by volunteers.

Currently the Center has 18 hermitages, ten of which have bathrooms and kitchenettes.

Ahimsa, Basil, and Rumi have been stabilized and updated. Sun has been modernized with a new kitchenette and bathroom. Shekinah was under attack by woodpeckers due to rotting wood under old insulation. Major electrical repairs, new siding and a new accessible bathroom are underway for Shekinah. Our Sisters have given us so much; they deserve the comfort of a safe home. Unfortunately, we will not be able to save Power and the original Barn is structurally unsound and unable to be stabilized.

Maintaining this number of aging structures, many of which are over 30 years old is no small task.

Over the past year, we launched a restoration effort, which we are now calling Preserve Our Heritage. The hermitages are truly loved by our retreatants; however, several of the hermitages including Shekinah were eroding from the effects of weather and inconsistent maintenance. Structural deficits were becoming apparent. With donor funds remaining from our Adopt a Hermitage campaign, we began a process to preserve these structures. To date


